BEHAVIORAL HEALTH & LAW ENFORCEMENT

- Nearly 1 in 25 adults in America live with a serious mental illness.
- As a crisis occurs, law enforcement officers & first responders are often called upon to respond and assist individuals & others involved in a mental health crisis.





OUR GOAL

- Increase awareness about mental illnesses and empower first responders.
- Strengthen law enforcement and other first responder's de-escalation skillset when faced with a mental health crisis.
- Build and strengthen relationships to effectively address the crisis through the identification of resources and accountability.

CRISIS INTERVENTION TRAINING (CIT)

The CIT program is a community partnership that provides mental health and substance use disorder awareness and education, effective communication and de-escalation interventions, improved community and collaborative relationships, and protection for our responding officers/personnel, individuals in behavioral health crises, and the community-at-large.

Our mission is to create a standard of excellence for law enforcement officers and other first responders in treating individuals with mental illness or in crisis.

HISTORY OF CIT

The concept of CIT was developed in the 1980s and has been proven to be an effective and evidence-based model for mental health awareness training for law enforcement and other first responders.
